This is an all day live in-person course that covers types of vascular access devices, vascular anatomy, infusate characteristics that affect device selection, maintenance care components, and complication management. Nurses in all settings, whether inpatient, ambulatory infusion or home infusion, can benefit from an up-to-date understanding of the how to manage these devices and prevent or manage complications. Implicit bias considerations will be woven into various sections to insure that clinicians are mindful and tailor their communications and care for the most effective vascular access for patients across cultural, racial, ethnic, socioeconomic, gender, intellect and age ranges.
